Questions to ask your child:

Reading

Be sure to practice having your child correct their own reading mistakes and retell you the story after reading. On the test, the more detail they use in retelling the story, the better. They are also frequently asked to define words in the text without using a form of the word.

JRITING

I am sending home copies of your child's personal narrative assessments that we did right before our February break. The grading rubric is attached to the story. If your child scored "Nonproficient in any of the areas, they receive a "Non-proficient" score. Most students did very well, but if they did not receive a "Proficient" score, they will have another chance at a later date.

This week we finished up our measurement lessons and are moving on to gathering, organizing, and analyzing data on graphs. We will use bar graphs and tally marks as two ways to organize and compare data.

Math questions to ask your child:

*What has our standard unit of measurement been lately? (centimeters)

- How can you measure using centimeters something that isn't straight? (cut string to measure or use a tape measure)
- How many more centimeters is 14 cm than 6 cm?
