Students need to write a topic sentence, at least three detail sentences, and a conclusion. We also check for capitals, periods, finger spacing, and spelling. These items do not have to be perfect, just demonstrate an understanding for each skill.

We finished up our challenging Math unit about addition and subtraction of teen numbers. Our next unit is a welcome relief with measuring and comparing lengths.

Math Questions to ask your child:
