Phonics

We have been asked to "pilot" a new phonics program that the district is considering using throughout the schools next year. It correlates with the reading program that we already use. Instead of worksheets, the program focuses a lot on sorting and writing words using certain phonetic qualities. Because we have already started our VOWAC Spelling program, I plan to use it in conjunction with the new program for the rest of the

school vear.

Questions to ask your child:

we are learning

Sight words are an important part of reading progress. These are the words that appear frequently in children's books and often don't make phonetic sense. We have been using the yellow lists of words in book bags as a way of studying and learning sight words. As the lists progress, they quickly get more difficult. I am encouraging the students to slow down and memorize the word lists so that they can recall them quickly in text. I would rather have them take time to really memorize each word and keep the same list for two or more weeks than to quickly pass the test, progress to the next level, then forget the basic words. The words are assessed every Wednesday.

This week we began using our writing dictionaries to help with spelling. Each child received a small paperback dictionary containing many words children commonly use in writing. It is arranged in alphabetical order and has many empty spaces for adding new words.

Our Math unit continues to explore different ways to solve subtraction problems through 20. We worked with "Math Discourse Partners" this week. Each child has a math partner (another student in our class) that helps them review and discuss word problems after solving them in our math journals.

Math Questions to ask your child:

- How does knowing that 17 10 = 7 help you solve 17 - 9 = ?
 - Can you solve this problem by taking from 10? Can you solve it by counting on? Which strategy do you like best?
