Reading

We have been talking about and practicing some strategies for reading challenging words in books. The ones we have talked about so far are: 1. checking the picture, 2. looking at the whole word including the ending, and 3. double checking it to see if it sounds right and makes sense in the sentence.

Writingen

This week we learned and wrote about fall. We made circle maps, then tree maps, then sentences. We also wrote topic sentences at the beginning of our pieces. We talked a lot about the job of a topic sentence to be to "introduce the topic".

math +2

Math has been all about noticing patterns in order to learn math addition facts fluently. We've especially focused on adding "Doubles" like 2 + 2, 5 + 5, 4 + 4, and "Doubles Plus 1". These include equations like 2 + 3, 4 + 5, and 5 + 6. Any patterns that young learners notice help them to understand the concepts and learn their math facts in a way that makes sense to them.

Math Questions to ask your child:

*How many equations can you make out of the following numbers: (3,4,7), (2,6,8), (3,7,10),

(1,6,7), (9,5,4)?
